The UK is in the grip of a numeracy crisis. Around half of working-age people have the numeracy skills of a primary school child. Poor numeracy costs our economy up to £25 billion annually and holds back individuals, families, and communities. This needs to change.

Low numeracy impacts lives in profound ways, limiting job prospects, creating financial stress, and reducing social mobility. It's a barrier that perpetuates inequality, affecting everything from employment to health. At National Numeracy, we are driven by a bold vision: to empower people with the confidence and skills to unlock brighter futures, especially in the communities that need it most.

Since the charity was founded in 2012, we've made significant strides in raising awareness of this hidden issue, challenging negative attitudes, and supporting both adults and children to become more confident with numbers. Our work is focused on practical, lasting impact – helping people progress in their careers, take control of their finances, and foster a positive approach to maths in the next generation.

The issue is vast, but we know what works. Low numeracy has a disproportionate impact on disadvantaged communities. By targeting those with the lowest numeracy skills, we're addressing a crucial piece of the social mobility puzzle. Our partnerships with employers, schools, and communities demonstrate that change is possible – and scalable. Together, we're enabling individuals to thrive with numbers, leading to stronger financial resilience and greater opportunities, and also to support the children in their care to feel positive about maths.

This is an exciting time for us. We've just launched an ambitious four-year strategy (2025-28) at the Houses of Parliament with backing from the Secretary of State for Education. We are on the cusp of significant growth, and we're looking for visionary trustees to join us in this next chapter.

As a trustee, you will play a pivotal role in driving our impact at scale. You will join a dynamic, passionate team committed to improving lives through numeracy. If you're inspired by the opportunity to make a real difference and have the strategic insight to help shape our future, we would love to have you on board.

The problem

Poor numeracy skills hold individuals and the country back, and change is urgently needed. A lack of number confidence and numeracy skills negatively affects lives and livelihoods, contributing to serious societal issues such as unemployment, poor health, and rising debt levels. Low numeracy acts as a persistent barrier to social mobility, with a person's socio-economic background being the strongest predictor of their numeracy level, and there is a pronounced gap in number confidence between men and women. We need to break this cycle and address the issue of low numeracy now.

Improving people's skills, confidence, and attitudes toward numbers and maths can make a tangible difference, opening up educational, employment and financial opportunities that lead to brighter futures. As the UK's only charity dedicated to everyday mathematics, National Numeracy plays a critical role in addressing this issue. By focusing on communities in greatest need, the charity aims to enhance social mobility and promote inclusion through improved numeracy skills.

Since 2012, National Numeracy's work has demonstrated that improving numeracy can help individuals overcome socioeconomic barriers, offering them the chance to thrive both personally and professionally. This not only benefits individuals but also strengthens communities and the wider economy.

Our vision

There are three Big Changes we want to see.

1. Numeracy for equality

Improving numeracy to help address systemic inequalities, level the playing field and create a wealth of opportunities.

2. Numeracy for success

Working towards a generational shift to a mathspositive culture, from cradle to career.

3. Numeracy for community

An inclusive, whole-community approach targeted towards areas of greatest need to help create communities empowered by number confidence.

Our mission

To empower people in disadvantaged communities to thrive by using numeracy to open up opportunities and access brighter futures.

Who we serve

Everyone can access our resources, but our priority is supporting people with low number confidence or skills in disadvantaged communities.

How we work

- We work directly with beneficiaries, supporting them in improving their number confidence and numeracy skills through face-to-face and online interventions.
- We work with those who support others, such as teachers, parents and carers who support children or employers who support their staff.
- We take a place-based approach and work hand-inhand in the community with a rich and varied group of supporters and partners who are deeply connected to the people and needs of particular places.
- We drive positive change by working with and influencing those who can effect change

The role

National Numeracy is looking to appoint up to four new trustees to join its charity Board, including a new Hon Treasurer, to replace retiring trustees, many who have reached their maximum term limit.

These are key appointments to help steer the charity through its next phase of development. The new trustees will be inspiring, dynamic and ambitious individuals who are committed to making a significant and lasting improvement to numeracy levels across the UK.

While we are open to applications from candidates with expertise and experience within a range of different professional disciplines, we are particularly interested in candidates that can demonstrate at least one of the following skill areas:

- Financial management and oversight, including accounting (for the role of Honourable Treasurer)
- Business development and fundraising
- Product and programme development
- Campaigning, PR and communications
- Legal
- Human resources
- Technology and online education
- · Strategy and change management

Trustees are encouraged to get to know National Numeracy well and to respond to opportunities to involve themselves in National Numeracy activities. Beyond board meetings this might include supporting key initiatives, such as National Numeracy Day, meeting with prospective strategic funders, or providing guidance on major projects to the Executive team as appropriate.

Whilst the charity is based in the South East of England, we are looking for the right candidates from across the UK and are willing to pay travel expenses for meeting attendance if required. We are also committed to broadening the diversity of the board and would like to hear from applicants who can contribute greater diversity of representation, experience and thinking, including Black, Asian and minority ethnic people, LGBTQ+ people and people with disabilities.









Key roles & responsibilities

- Participate in the role of the board in providing effective oversight of the charity.
- Help to develop and refine the strategy as necessary to ensure National Numeracy achieves its aims.
- Contribute to meetings of the Board of Trustees and be willing to participate in any sub-committees that might be suitable to your skill set.
- Participate in ensuring that the charity follows governance best practice and good management of resources, being aware of risk.
- Be willing to represent National Numeracy externally to build its profile, influence opinion-formers and raise funds. This may include appearances in the media, speaking platforms and more informal communication.
- Help to initiate and foster relationships with potential and existing strategic funders and partners, including business leaders and senior government personnel.
- In all activities, help establish and maintain National Numeracy as a highly respected organisation.

Honorary Treasurer only (see Honorary Treasurer's handbook here for more information):

- Help the executive to present financial reports to the board in a format that helps the board understand the charity's financial position.
- Advise the board on how to carry out its financial responsibilities.
- · Work with professional advisors, such as the charity's auditors.
- Oversee the preparation and scrutiny of the annual accounts.

We will provide trustee training as necessary.

They will be an engaged, enthusiastic and creative individual with a passion to help contribute to the next phase of development for the charity to scale-up and make a really important difference.

Governance overview

National Numeracy framework for leadership and governance

The framework for governance aims to ensure that the leadership and governance of National Numeracy is strategic and highly effective. The framework supports the following key principles:

- Trustees work as an effective team and understand their accountability and the part they play in the strategic leadership of National Numeracy to achieve a significant and sustainable impact.
- Trustees are appointed to the Board of Trustees and tasks are delegated so that all members contribute; feel that their individual skills, knowledge and experience are well used; and that the overall workload is shared.
- The Board of Trustees provides support, challenge and encouragement to the CEO and senior leadership team.
- Trustees ensure that statutory requirements and regulations are met, that National Numeracy provides value for money in its use of resources and that board business is conducted efficiently and effectively.

Method and meetings

The framework is aligned to the main objectives. The CEO provides regular progress reports to trustees as well as a comprehensive set of papers for the quarterly board meeting. This supplements the National Numeracy Scorecard which is updated quarterly as a reporting tool on progress against financial and social impact targets. Trustee meetings usually last three hours. There are also a small number of permanent, e.g. nominations, and temporary, e.g. strategy development, sub-committees. These committees also meet quarterly immediately prior/following the main board meeting.

Terms of appointment

This is a voluntary role requiring attendance at quarterly board meetings and the occasional meeting with the CEO and other members of the executive team. The office is based in Falmer, East Sussex, but the board meetings take place in London or virtually. National Numeracy will pay for travel and subsistence expenses.

The term of office for all trustees is three years. Subject to remaining eligibility to be a trustee, any trustee may be reappointed or re-elected.

As a parent I struggled when my kids asked for help with their homework. There's a sense of shame and feeling inadequate because your children are asking you for help and you can't provide it. You're meant to provide for your kids.

But now I've done the National Numeracy Challenge I've grown confident with numbers. I don't have to hide from my kids when they ask me for help, and I really enjoy doing it. I don't want them to be afraid of numbers like I was at school. We get a buzz out of doing the homework together, and I'm learning from them too. I'm six feet tall but it makes me feel seven feet being able to help them out. Improving my numeracy hasn't just helped me with my kids, it's helped me at work too. I've enhanced my CV and future job prospects.

These achievements led to Jason being named a National Numeracy Day Hero, appearing in the media and in videos alongside our celebrity ambassadors to promote the benefits of numeracy.
